## The Minutes for January 22, 2006



The meeting was convened at 2:11PM at the UMC Memorial Union in Columbia, Missouri.

**Members Present:** Ed Baur, Bill Wright, Charlie Ward, Ken Fee, Wayne Bartlett, and Milton Garber. Not present: Bob Holliman, Selden Trimble, and Aaron Dubin.

The Minutes of October 2nd, 2005 board meeting were reviewed and approved unanimously with one amendment.

**Spring Meeting:** May 21st, 2006 at MC Memorial Union at 2PM.

**Treasurer Report:** Balance of \$3011.79 as of August 31st. Incentives issue! Bill presented a proposed budget. Ed Baur paid for printing of a past bulletin. The report was approved unanimously. Motion Amend TD profit \$400. Change MCB to \$1200. Discussed issue on MCA memberships modest dues increase. \$12/8/5. September 1, 2006 TD Incentive \$100 Discuss later. # Chess Strategy with Life Master Bob Holliman

## "A Gem of a Game"

The phone rang the other day. Hello, Bob, it's Vesselin; I am in Wijk aan Zee. I play Aronian next. What do you recommend? Well, V (when you are on a first name basis with the world champion you don't have to use full names, initials are fine), as I watched your games from San Luis it is obvious you have no regard for pieces or pawns, only the position. Well, of course, Dr. Bob it's the play that matters. Well, V, you know I really like that approach. Why not try something that will really show the power of piece play, go for bishops this time. Thanks, B, I'll do that. Thus inspired Topalov plays a gem of a game! (Well, it could have happened that way but neither of us are talking). **1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 e6 3.Nf3 b6 4.g3 Ba6 5.b3** I like this a bit more than the Qc2 move **5...Bb4+ 6.Bd2 Be7** Chess analysis is sometimes a labor intensive mess - not the analysis mind you, but putting the thought process into print. Here Aronian has taken two moves to do what he could have done in one by simply playing **5...Be7**. However his trade off is that White will have to use a move to put the bishop on its desired a1-h8 diagonal. **7.Bg2 c6 8.Bc3 d5 9.Ne5 Nfd7 10.Nxd7** This is all known theory but my database is running out of references quickly. The idea of taking the knight may need some conceptualization. First, White wants to retain a pawn structure that is fluid. Fluid simply means not fixed. Had

White castled he would have allowed Black to exchange on e5 leaving his a1-h8 bishop somewhat restricted. **10...Nxd7 11.Nd2 0-0 12.0-0 Nf6 13.e4 b5 14.exd5 exd5 15.Re1 Rb8 16.c5 Bc8** We have just left known theory. Quiz time - do you believe these guys know all these games that lead up to these positions or do they operate on general principals? do against the c&d pawns **18...dxe4**

**19.Ne5 Qd5 20.Qe1 Bf5 21.g4! Bg6 22.f3**

**b4** This zwischenzug gives White a powerful edge. The queen must retreat, the c6 square is under seige and the Black bishop is forced to relocate to the king's side and I doubt this bothered Topalov at all as that's where the dark squared piece belongs to support the advance of the central pawn roller **23.fxe4 Qe6 24.Bb2 Bf6**

**25.Nxc6 Qxc6 26.e5 Qa6 27.exf6 Rfe8**

**28.Qf1** No need to fear the exchange of queens. Black does not have a dark square bishop so White is, effectively, a piece up. Rooks are horrid defensive pieces by the way, they can only sit in front of pawns. **28...Qe2 29.Qf2 Qxg4 30.h3**

Plans for the 2007 KC Masters Invitational are already in the works. Besides making the event FIDE rated next year, The Chess Club KC Masters Invitational Committee is working on ways to increase the prize fund.

# Spotlight on Missouri Chess

I am pleased to present what is expected to be a quarterly column for the Missouri Chess Bulletin. By way of introduction, I grew up in St. Louis and have lived most of my life here, playing first board for the Parkway North PawnPushers chess team in the early 70s (that's 1970s, not 1870s, by the way). I currently work as an optometrist in St. Louis and am also the scholastic chess columnist for the popular web "magazine" at [www.chesscafe.com](http://www.chesscafe.com). In addition, my wife and I have begun a personalized products company ([www.picproducts.net](http://www.picproducts.net)) that produces customized t-shirts and other items for individuals or clubs.

The goal of this column is to bring you Missouri-specific information about our own chess personalities and events. For my ChessCafe column I have interviewed world-class grandmasters and have also written about small children just starting out in chess; I expect to do the same here. What I'm looking for is not just a story about the top player in this or that tournament - if someone has an interesting story to tell, I'm interested. It doesn't matter whether the person is a child or an adult, master or patzer, player or coach or organizer. For this inaugural column, I had the pleasure of speaking with Kansas City's Zebedee Fortman III, who had a spectacular 2005. He won outright the Master/Expert section of the 2005 Missouri Class Championships last June and tied for first place at the 2005 Missouri Open this past September, going undefeated

in both tournaments. He gained nearly 100 rating points over the last half of 2005 and is currently rated 2075, which according to the Winter 2006 Missouri Chess Bulletin places him at #20 in the state.

Now 32 years old, Zeb has been playing chess since he was a little boy, having been taught by his father Zeb Fortman II, a prominent chess teacher in Kansas City. Zeb III also had the advantage of receiving some early lessons from Michael Brooks. More recently, he has gone through several tutoring sessions with IM Igor Khmelnitsky of Philadelphia, who has spent time with Zeb analyzing his games and providing him with an overall plan to follow. "He taught me how to study," reports Zeb.

In addition, Zeb will frequently set up a mid-game position, either from his own games or those of others, and study the position deeply for about 10-15 moves, testing his own analysis with the help of Fritz software. He tends to spend most of his free time studying and playing chess, typically fast games on the Internet Chess Club, although he makes time to also play in perhaps 12-15 OTB tournaments annually. The highlight of his chess career, he said, occurred a number of

years ago when he placed first in the Under 2000 section of the Las Vegas National Open.

Besides playing chess, Zeb also teaches chess weekly at two Kansas City-area elementary schools. As such, he especially enjoyed the recent A&E movie *Knights of the South Bronx*, which is an adaptation of the true-life story of chess teacher David MacEnulty. Zeb was particularly impressed that MacEnulty essentially rearranged his life in order to make a difference in the lives of the kids he worked with (for more information about MacEnulty, see my archived January 2006 Scholastic Chess ChessCafe column).

So what motivates Zeb? Very simply, he said, "I love to play chess, I love the camaraderie." He also loves to go on the attack, as evidenced by the following game:

The idea is to not block the c1-h6 diagonal with the pawn while keeping the option of trading bishops on h6 and reserving the King Knight's options of developing to e2, f3, or h3. It's a useful move and keeps Black guessing for a few more moves concerning White's setup. 7...b5 8.Qd2 b4 9.Nd1  
 Bd7 Diagram



This Bd7 is not a bad move, but I do not think it solves Black's strategic problem of a safe and straight forward way of developing his pieces. Black has several reasonable moves and ways to deploy his pieces and now would be a good time to make a decision and follow through with one of them. Normally when White plays f4 in the closed Sicilian, the most solid way for Black to handle it, is to play f5 at some point. One way to prepare f5 would be e6, Nge7, and finally f5 with a very solid position. Another method is to play e5, Ng-e7, exf4

and finally f5. One could also skip exf4 and just play f5. If White plays fxe5, Black should recapture with his knight on e5. Another neat way for Black to deploy is 9...Bg4 This threatens Bxd1, so after Nf3, Black could play Qc8, h3 Bxf3, Bxf3, Nf6, g4 Nd7 with a reverse English type of game. Or perhaps after 9...Bg4 10.Nf3, he could play Nf6 not fearing 11.e5)

I will let you decide whether Black should now play dxe5 or immediately Nd7 10.Nf3 Qc8 (f5 followed by Nf6 looks more comfortable) 11.h3 a5 Diagram



Black is not solving his kingside development needs. Also in some lines, Black needs Na5 to be available. Black's queenside expansion should backfire due to his lack of development 12.Rb1 I do not like this move. It pins the b2 pawn to the rook on b1 and prevents White from having greater choices. I would like to be able to play c3 and d4. So g4 or Rc1 would be better. 12...a4 13.g4 Nd4 14.0-0 Bc6 Bc6 looks like it loses a pawn to Bxd4 cxd4, Qf2...However, b3 seems to give black enough play. Instead of Bc6 14.... h5 looks interesting.

15.Qf2 This is not right even though White does get a better game later. I like Nh2 or Nh4. Avoiding exchanges gives Black the most difficulties. The plan is to correct the bad Rb1 move with Rc1 and start firing with c3 and d4. Notice that Luther has been aggressively posturing on the kingside and now should switch his attack to the center and queenside exposing Black's weakening pawn moves and uncoordinated pieces. Jones will still need to spend many tempos in order to complete his kingside development and secure king safety. 15...Nxf3+ 16.Bxf3
